# TOP STORIES OF 2023



## The Intel® Partnership at MTC

Marion Tech is among the first community colleges in Ohio to offer an Intel® Semiconductor Manufacturing short-term certificate. This 10 credit hour micro-certificate program provides the education and training necessary to gain entry level employment in the growing semiconductor manufacturing industry.

Intel is expected to hire 3,000 workers for the factories in central Ohio, including more than 2,000 technicians, more than 700 engineers, and up to 150 support workers. Hundreds of additional jobs are expected to come online as regional semiconductor suppliers ramp up hiring. In October, representatives from Intel® toured the college's electrical engineering, mechanical engineering, robotics and automation, and smart manufacturing labs.

Courses were developed in conjunction with the Ohio Association of Community College's Semiconductor Collaboration Network thanks to a grant from Intel to create a jobs pipeline for the semiconductor industry and the ecosystem that surrounds the industry. Included among the collaboration network's goals for hiring are attracting women, underrepresented minorities, veterans, and military families to jobs in the semiconductor field.

## Marion Tech Launches Ohio's First Community College BSN Program

In spring of 2023 Marion Tech took the lead and became the first community college in Ohio to offer a Bachelor's of Science degree in Nursing (BSN). The program is designed to prepare graduates for roles in nursing leadership, management, research, and evidence-based practice, as well as preparing students for advanced practice nursing programs. Students of the program will take courses fully online, allowing them to work while pursuing a degree.

## Scholarships and Stage Lights

The Marion Technical College Foundation was excited to host its first-ever Scholarships and Stage Lights event on Friday, January 20 at the May Pavilion. The Marion Tech Foundation and Kit Fogle with Merrill Lynch sponsored the *Chicks with Hits* concert featuring country music legends Terri Clark, Pam Tillis, and Suzy Bogguss at the Marion Palace Theatre.

“This was the first time we’ve done anything like this. The purpose was to make people aware of the Marion Technical College Foundation and the reasons we raise money for scholarships,” said Mike Stuckey, director of the MTC Foundation.

## The Debbie and Treg Stark Scholarship Fund

A retired Marion Technical College dean and her husband are investing in supporting students and second chances. The Debbie and Treg Stark Scholarship Fund prioritizes applicants who are formerly incarcerated and those majoring in business and IT.

“Reducing recidivism means they end up not going back to their old habits and networks. Education lets them ease back into communities. They can get jobs and build new networks. It helps them contribute positively to the community,” said Debbie (Caserta) Stark of Marion.

Both Debbie and Treg Stark have taught at Marion Technical College and at the local prisons. Despite having retired from Marion Tech, Debbie is still teaching a few classes each year. The Starks’ generous donation matches their long history of teaching and supporting students from all backgrounds.

“This is an investment in Marion’s future,” Treg said. “It makes you feel proud to give back.”



## Education Equity Scholarship

Marion Technical College now offers an Education Equity Scholarship in memory of George Floyd and others whose lives were cut short by racial and social injustice. Two scholarships will be awarded for students annually.

“This is one of a number of steps Marion Tech is taking to address the racism affecting people in our community,” said Dr. Ryan McCall, president of Marion Technical College. “It is up to each one of us to work to create a better future.”

Incoming students from an underrepresented group with a demonstrated financial need in good academic standing may apply each spring. This scholarship supports students who further the inclusion, diversity and equity initiatives of the college.

## OTHER HIGHLIGHTS OF 2023

- A remarkable teacher who touched thousands of lives, Donna Day now has a scholarship fund in her memory. The **Donna Day Scholarship Fund** was created by her former student, Kathy Rice, and will help a Marion Technical College student with financial needs from Green Camp, where Mrs. Day was born and served throughout her life; January.
- Dr. Ryan and Rachel McCall knows the experience of being the first in their families to attend college. They created the **McCall Family Scholarship**, a new scholarship fund to help other first-generation college students make it to graduation; January.
- **Brandy Winfield OPOTA Classroom Ribbon Cutting** was held at Marion Tech Downtown. The space is named in memory of Deputy Brandy Winfield, an alumnus who was killed in the line of duty; April.
- Marion Tech awarded degrees and certificates to 374 graduates during the **Fifty-First Annual Commencement** on May 12 at the Marion Palace Theatre. Graduates ranged in age from 17 to 59 years old and came from 27 Ohio counties; May.
- **2023 Golf Outing** held at Kings Mill Golf Club raised over \$32,000 for scholarships and allowed us to develop six new named scholarship funds; May.
- The **Augenstein Family Scholarship** was developed in the memory of Richard Augenstein to support physical therapist assistant (PTA) students; June.
- Jill Chitwood sponsored the naming rights for a conference room at Marion Tech Downtown, and developed the **Jill Chitwood & Dennis Kneisley Scholarship**, giving preference to second-year business students graduating from River Valley High School; July.

- Three donors supported **The Forge Business Classes and Competition: Alluvial Private Wealth, Steve and Brenda Johnston, and Gary Ferriman**, president of Showplace Rent-to-Own. The Forge program supports local entrepreneurs and small businesses by providing startup money to business plan competition winners; October.
- The annual **Marion Tech Big Tent Event** was held on the Marion Campus. The Marion Public Library joined us as special guests and awarded certificates of completion to dozens of children who participated in the local Dolly Parton's Imagination Library program; October.
- The **L1NK One Stop Ribbon Cutting** was held in Bryson Hall. The L1NK One Stop centralizes main administrative offices so that Marion Tech can better serve students; November.
- Our annual **Alumni Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony** was held in the Health Technologies Center (HTC) building on the Marion Campus. Five new alumni were inducted; November.
- **Dr. Amy M. Adams and John Collet** started a scholarship fund for Wyandot County students in the memory of their parents, George and Janis Collet. George and Janis were lifetime farmers while George was also a longtime Whirlpool employee in Marion; November.
- **Dr. G. Scott & Pam Drew and Dr. Vicky & Rodney Wood** have also developed named scholarship funds this year.
